Purpose: Provide COVID-19 Provincial and National Updates for the Week of March 1st to 5th

Reported COVID-19 Numbers as of 1:45 PM EST on Friday, March 5th, 2021

• **Globally**: 116,447,544 total cases; 21,822,363 active cases; 2,585,023 deaths; 92,040,158 resolved

• USA: 29,534,769 total cases; 8,905,966 active cases; 533,816 deaths; 20,094,987 resolved

• Canada: 878,391 total cases; 29,903 active cases; 22,151 deaths; 826,337 resolved

• Ontario: 310,164 total cases; 10,378 active cases; 7,046 deaths; 293,154 resolved

Press Conference Highlights: March 1st to 5th, 2021

- On March 1st, the government of Canada announced that the AstraZeneca vaccine is now approved for use in Canada and that they are on track for all Canadians to have access to a vaccine by September.
- Ontario reported the highest increase in new cases Thursday with another 994 infections and 10 new deaths.

 to keep ourselves, families, and communities safe, especially considering that new, more
 transmissible COVID-19 variants are being detected across the country.

Canada wide updates:

- 87,085 tests performed today, 24,763,481 total tests performed, with a 3.7% positivity. Over 2.16 million vaccine doses have also been administered to date, while 1,992 people are currently in hospital due to the disease.
- The majority of cases (67.8%) and deaths (78.9%) have been reported by Ontario and Quebec
- On First Nations reserves, as of March 3rd, Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) is aware of 21,729 confirmed positive COVID-19, including 991 hospitalizations, 20,114 recovered cases, and 240 deaths.
 - The rate of reported COVID-19 cases in First Nations is currently 74% higher than in the broader Canadian population.
 - The COVID-19 case fatality rate among First Nations is about 42% of the case fatality rate in the general Canadian population.
 - o 92% of those who tested positive for COVID-19 have recovered.
- Minister of Public Services and Procurement Anita Anand stated that Canada was on track to receive approximately 945,000 doses of COVID-19 vaccine supply this week, which she stated includes the weekly Pfizer shipment and the first shipment of the newly approved AstraZeneca vaccine.

- Several premiers announced new plans to move their provincial rollout of the COVID-19 vaccine to four-month intervals between doses, instead of the 3-4 week schedule recommended for the Pfizer and Moderna shots.
- The Johnson & Johnson vaccine is the fourth COVID-19 shot approved for use in Canada and the only
 one that requires just a single dose. Canada has pre-purchased 10 million doses of the Johnson &
 Johnson product with options to buy another 28 million doses. In clinical trials, the vaccine was
 shown to be 66% effective overall in preventing moderate to severe COVID-19, and also effective
 against variants of concern

Ontario specific updates:

- Provincially, as of March 5th, the 7-day average number of daily cases was 1,063, test positivity was 2.3% for the last week.
- There are currently 649 patients hospitalized with COVID-19, 281 of which are in the ICU. Of those, 183 are on a ventilator.
- There have been 1,285 cases of COVID-19 reported to date on-reserve in Ontario.
- Chief Medical Officer of Health for Ontario stated that in the past eight days, 26% of all positive samples screened positive for a variant of concern.
- Premier Ford joined Canada's Premiers for a <u>Virtual News Conference</u> where they called upon the federal government to increase the Federal Health Transfer from 22% to 35%. They deem the increase reasonable and based on a long-term forecast by every province and territory. This must be addressed in the upcoming federal government budget as there is a risk that the provinces won't be able to pay for all the services their populations need. The most vulnerable will suffer. The costs of COVID will be for the long-term: for long-term symptoms, catching up on surgeries.
 - Premier Ford stated that as they are waiting to get more supplies from the feds they are focused on the administration of the vaccines. Yesterday, Ontario reached a new record of over 30,000 doses administered.
 - As the pandemic declines, there will be 2 top priorities for all Canadians: rebuild our economy and rebuild our health care system. The re-build of the health care system will be more difficult – the economy is already in the re-building process. In addition to back-logged surgeries, there are many people struggling with mental health issues and long-term care homes are in desperate need of support.
